The program has a small computer room. They use it for doing homework that schools ask for. 98% of the children who come for tutoring to the Program have no internet signal in their homes. Computers in the program fortunately have internet signal and kids can do homework for

free. Many times, schools/teachers ask students to do homework provided from internet or scientific books but these activities have an economic cost. So this can be a problem for them but when they come to the program they are able to do some of this homework. In addition, to to students, we also have some teachers who are going back to school to continue their education and the computers help them greatly as well.

As we explained in the previous E-News, Cross Catholic is an organization in Miami, Florida that is helping the program with food and some school scholarships every year. They ask for bi-annual reports to show how and for whom the money was used for that time period and these are photos of just a few of the kids and families who have benefited in the current year.

New Blessings


In the last couple months two great Blessings have come into the lives of program members.

Coffee Project Update

Coffee sales are down. We have had no sales at all in the month of July.

I have given out sample pounds, which we now use to promote the Weebly site and send out recruiting e-mails on an occasional basis. We are permitted 5 mailings a month of up to 500 receiving each mailing.

Sister Sandra and I have developed a list of places we hope to utilize as sales outlets. Our list has led to several polite refusals.

Our best prospect at this point is the Catholic Charismatic **C**enter. We just received permission to set up a table and sell during or after masses, it now appears that our first effort will be Sandy and I selling after the Spanish mass Wednesday noon.

We are reaching out to a few friends to have help and cover more masses.

We also have been approved to sell at the Christmas Fest at the Presbyterian Church on 7 December.

I am reaching out to a friend with writing skills to perhaps collaborate on an e-book about coffee that could use to refer to our Coffee sales and her business.

I have sent recent e-mails to people who have sold for us in the past to see if I could line up anything new with them.

There is very little outstanding coffee on consignment. \$100 with the Maryknoll House in Chicago and the man in Kerrville does a pay as he goes and he currently has 100 pounds.

10 pounds were given to immersion mission members who visited Caminando this year.

We hold a small supply in Guatemala mostly just for use at the program house.

*** As an additional note, Mario and Megan have been working with a local Roaster in North Carolina, who is willing to roast and package some Family Coffee for the program, so we will be able to fill orders for coffee from North Carolina, as well as Texas. Megan and Mario are also seeking out local parishes and groups who would be interested in buying as well as selling Family Coffee.

We recently added Dark Roast to the offerings of our Family Coffee.

Meditation

Every Sunday morning I take a light jog around a park near my home. There's a lake located in one corner of the park. Each time I jog by this lake, I see the same elderly woman sitting at the water's edge with a small metal cage sitting beside her.

This past Sunday my curiosity got the best of me, so I stopped jogging and walked over to her. As I got closer, I realized that the metal cage was in fact a small trap. There were three turtles, unharmed, slowly walking around the base of the trap. She had a fourth turtle in her lap that she was carefully scrubbing with a spongy brush.

"Hello," I said. "I see you here every Sunday morning. If you don't mind my nosiness, I'd love to know what you're doing with these turtles."

She smiled. "I'm cleaning off their shells," she replied. "Anything on a turtle's shell, like algae or scum, reduces the turtle's ability to absorb heat and impedes its ability to swim. It can also corrode and weaken the shell over time."

"Wow! That's really nice of you!" I exclaimed.

She went on: "I spend a couple of hours each Sunday morning, relaxing by this lake and helping these little guys out. It's my own strange way of making a difference."

"But don't most freshwater turtles live their whole lives with algae and scum hanging from their shells?" I asked.

"Yep, sadly, they do," she replied.

I scratched my head. "Well then, don't you think your time could be better spent? I mean, I think your efforts are kind and all, but there are fresh water turtles living in lakes all around the world. And 99% of these turtles don't have kind people like you to help them clean off their shells. So, no offense... but how exactly are your localized efforts here truly making a difference?" The woman giggled aloud. She then looked down at the turtle in her lap, scrubbed off the last piece of algae from its shell, and said, "Sweetie, if this little guy could talk, he'd tell you I just made all the difference in the world."

This reading brings to mind the idea that though small and seemingly insignificant, these little turtles are given a small amount of care and attention which ultimately will make a huge difference in their lives. How can we draw from this reading in our own lives? When in your life have you been presented with seemingly insignificant events or moments that when given the proper care and attention became something great and significant or really made a difference? How can we make a difference in seemingly small and insignificant ways?

We would also like to provide a cultural/spiritual enrichment trip for our neighbors.

At present one of our greatest needs is for help in the United States to find market outlets for our Family Coffee.
